General information

Dear Parents,

Welcome to our 6th week of school! We are really pleased to see your child learning and be familiarized with the routine of the class.

For the past month, we have been giving and reinforcing lessons in Grace & Courtesy and Care of the Environment, which allow children to interact positively with adults, peers, and works. We have also introduced them to Montessori material in the Language, Math, Writing, and Cultural areas. We have witnessed and are impressed with all of their growing abilities.

Culture

2th and 3rd graders:

In Science, we are going to learn all about the composition and uses of rocks and minerals, their properties, and how to identify them. Also, we are going to be learning about landforms, comparing and contrasting geographical features. We are going to introduce the parts of the plant and students will be doing deep studies on this topic. We are going to be doing lots of experiments about plants.

For our culture, we are going to learn about the Fundamental Needs of Human beings.

Language

Writing: Dear Parents from next week we are having a new writing teacher. She will come four times a week for 45 minutes each time. She is a license English teacher. I am sure students are going to enjoy the new teacher.

Spelling and Language: Each week your child will be focusing on different words and doing a variety of work around those words. Your child will be working at their level; I have 3 different levels of work within each of my grade level groups. Remember to check your child's spelling list every Monday.
